# Grant helps pharmacy become Dispensary of Hope

A recent Salina Regional Health Foundation grant is supporting the Outpatient Pharmacy at Salina Regional Health Center in becoming a Dispensary of Hope to increase medication access for uninsured and low income patients.

Dispensary of Hope is a non-profit U.S. medication distributor that has over 200 distribution sites across 30 states. In Kansas there is only one Dispensary of Hope site located in Wichita.

Patients who are uninsured and meet income requirements 300% below the federal poverty level can receive their much-needed medications free of charge.

"Recent additions to the Dispensary of Hope formulary, especially some insulin formulations, make this program attractive," said Steven Blanner, Pharmacy director at Salina Regional.

The service will begin being offered in early 2023 and patients from all over the region will be able to receive their medications through the Outpatient Pharmacy at Salina Regional if they're qualified for the program. Healthcare providers from around the region will be receiv-

ing information about how to get their patients enrolled.

"We anticipate serving uninsured and low income patients from throughout the region, not just patients in Salina," Blanner said.

The cost for some forms of insulin used by patients with diabetes can be more than \$300 per month. Many other life saving medications also are expensive.

Recent research at a Dispensary of Hope health system showed a reduction in cost for serving these qualified patients of \$3,161 per year. Additionally, the study demonstrated a 20% reduction in inpatient stays for participants in the program.

"The Foundation's support allows us to get the program up and running quickly to meet patient needs," Blanner said.

### Cancer patient sees Morrison House as a godsend

Radiation treatment for cancer often requires daily appointments over the course of multiple weeks. Patients from outside Salina receiving care at the Tammy Walker Cancer Center are welcome to stay at the Rebecca A. Morrison House to help alleviate travel time and expenses.

There is no charge for guests who stay at the Morrison House. The service is supported entirely by donations.

Gary De Kler, Beloit, was a guest at the Morrison House this summer while undergoing treatment for prostate cancer. He would often stay Monday through Friday and return home on the weekends.

"People can spend fortunes on hotels and gas during situations like this," De Kler said. "I can't tell you what a tremendous gift the Morrison House is. It speaks a lot of Salina as a community to have a place like this for patients and families. From a humanitarian standpoint, it's the single-greatest gift I've experienced in my lifetime."

De Kler brought groceries and fixed many of his meals using the house's stocked kitchens, kept up with laundry

and found himself completely at ease with his surroundings. His private bedroom and bathroom was comfortable, but he often spent time in the common areas of the home visiting with staff, other patients and family members.

De Kler wrapped up his radiation treatments in late July and the results to date have been promising. He continues to take hormonal therapies to battle the disease and his doctor will continue to monitor for signs of recurrence.

## CHIP grant supports 5 Red Cross Community Blood Drives in 2023

Every two seconds someone in the United States needs lifesaving blood. A \$19,500 Community Health Investment Program (CHIP) grant is supporting the American Red Cross Kansas-Oklahoma Region's efforts to conduct five community blood drives in Salina in 2023.

The Red Cross estimates that each community blood drive costs about \$3,900 including staff wages, equipment and transportation expenses. The Red Cross's costs for conducting community blood drives have been rising due to inflation and the need for increased safety measures required since the beginning of the COVID-19

pandemic.

Stress from the pandemic also has at times decreased inventory of blood supplies to critically low levels never seen before for certain blood products.

"We are grateful for the Foundation's continued partnership as a major supporter for blood services in Saline County," said Jeny Mash, Kansas philanthropy officer with the Red Cross. "We also ask for the community's support by donating at these upcoming drives."
